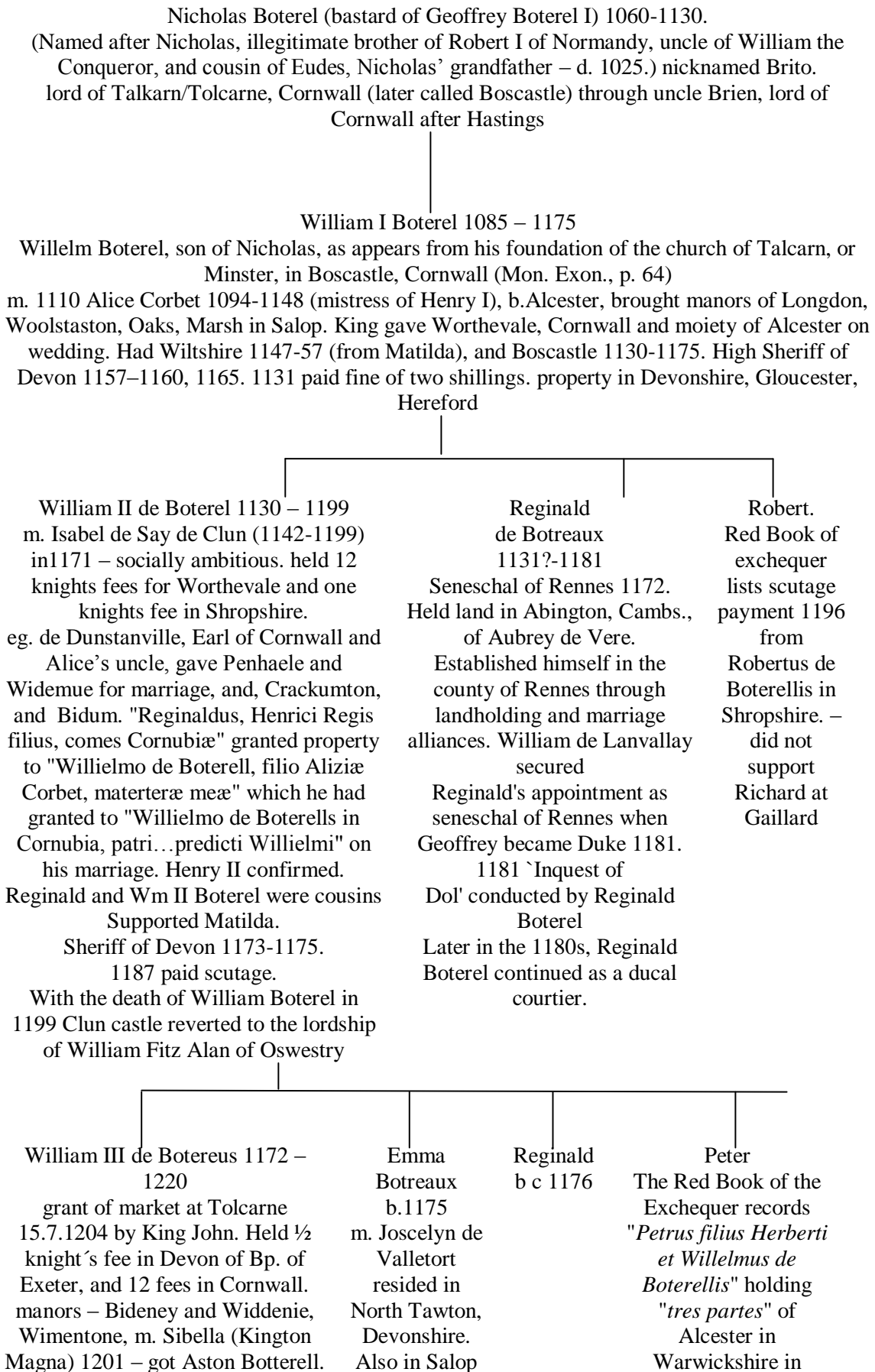


Bottrill family – Shropshire branch



1199 paid fine of 300 marks and 2 goshawks for livery of Penhale and 1/2 of Alcester, and confirmation of lands.

1211 paid Worthevale scutage for 12 knights.

High Sheriff of Cornwall 1205-09 and paid 233:4 shillings per annum for the farm of the county. (left in disgrace when rebelled against John). 1211 he paid scutage for twelve knights fees in Worthevale, Cornwall for not going on both Scottish and Welsh expeditions.

(dictum of Kenilworth 20.10.66 Henry III pardoned him for war with king)

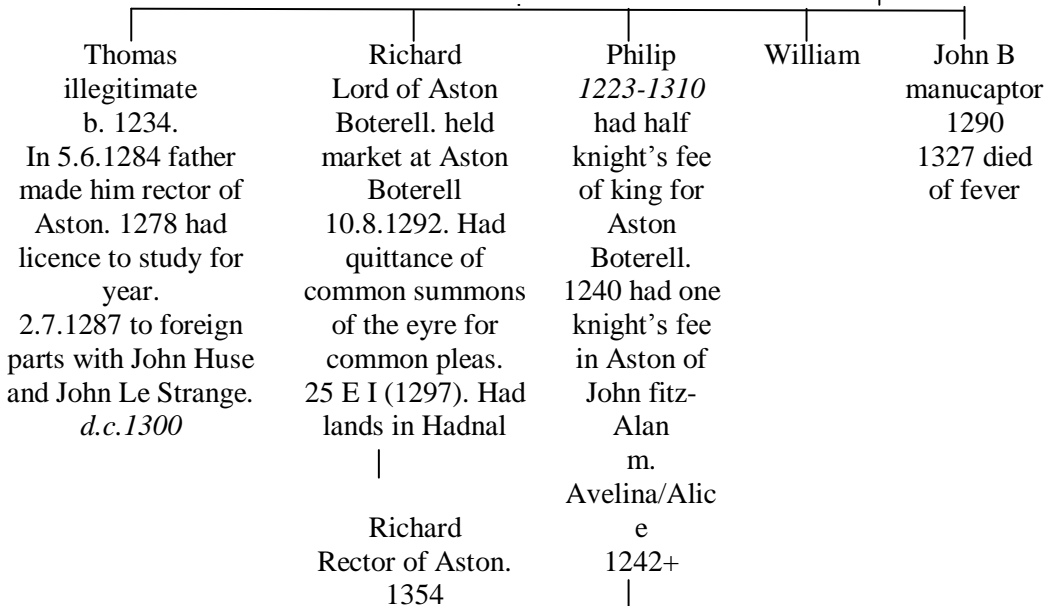

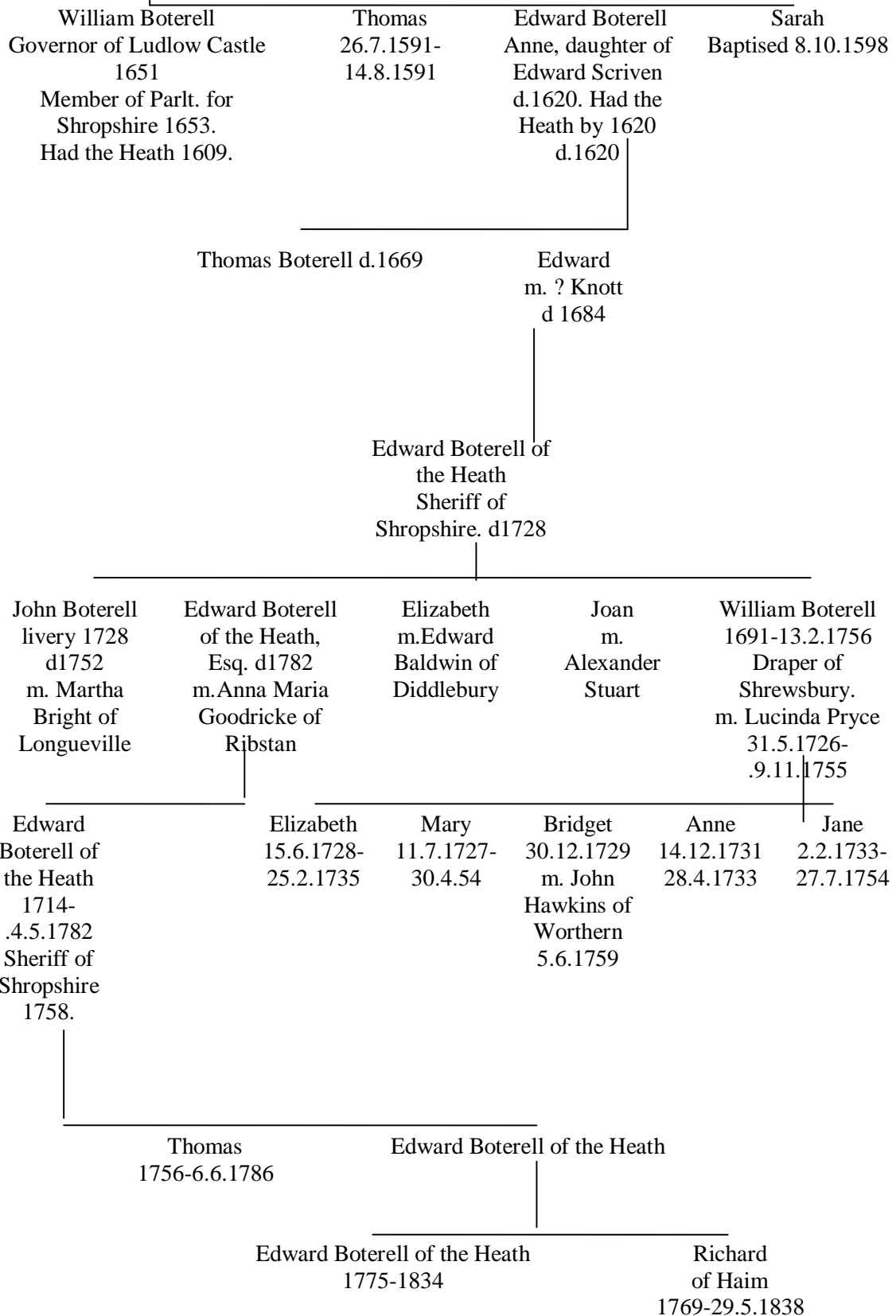
volume 11 1260. Had manor at Aston from Henry III 1263.

1263 Sir Thos had grant of mkt and fair at Eston Botterell and grant of free warren there. 1273 held court at Eston. King gave lands in Pupplinton and Chirchhull. Wife Petronilla
